

TERMINAL 91 FUN FACTS

Discover Maritime Operations at Terminal 91

Terminal 91 provides short-term and long-term moorage for fishing and commercial vessels, including factory trawlers, longliners, tugs, barges, ferries, research vessels, excursion vessels, ships of State, and other commercial vessels.

The terminal has over 8,000 LF of moorage (Pier 90 and 91). The 15 buildings on site are used for fishing-related activities:

- Cold storage
- Fish processing
- Equipment manufacturing
- Maintenance services
- Marine repair

FISH STATS



Seafood exported out of Seattle and Tacoma was valued at **\$638 million** in 2016.

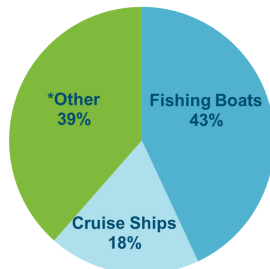


In 2013, the Alaska seafood industry created **23,900 jobs** and **\$1.34 billion** in labor income in the Puget Sound region**.



In 2017, there were more than **800 port calls** to Terminal 91, of which **361** were fishing related.
